## Renting an Apartment

When selecting an apartment there are several important questions to ask yourself. The most important question to ask yourself is: how much can I afford in monthly rent? What you think you can afford may not be what the apartment complex may think. More and more landlords are requiring proof of income and have income requirements for potential renters. Thinks about it, as a manager of an apartment complex, would it be wise to just let anyone coming in off the street sign a lease agreement? What happens if you go to a restaurant ring up a $\$ 250$ bill and have no money to pay for it? What happens if your rent is due and you have no money to pay for it? If you are going to college, some university towns that cater to student apartments may allow you to have a guarantor. Which is

## Let's talk money.

How much can you afford to pay in rent? The "rule of thumb" is $33 \%$ of your gross income (this is generally what landlords look at for rent qualifying). To be a little safer and have more money for other expenses look at a rent that is closer to $25 \%$ of your net income.
